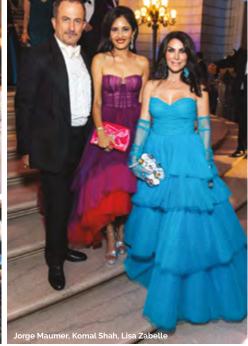








































WORLD PREMIERE

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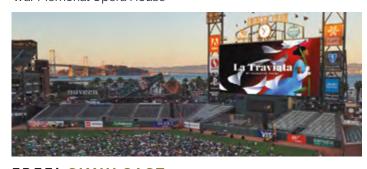
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Donor Spotlight

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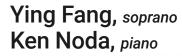

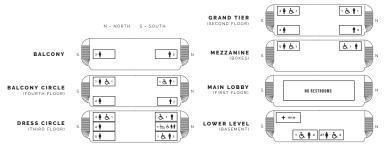

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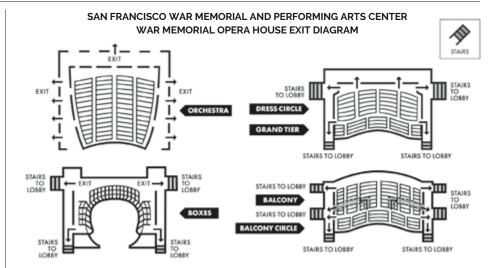

THE FUTURE OF OPERA

Dialogues of the Carmelites

ACT I

The first signs of the French Revolution are beginning to shake the country. In his library, the Marquis de la Force and his son, the Chevalier, are worried about Blanche, the Chevalier's fearful, nervous sister, whose carriage has been held up by a mob on her way home. When Blanche arrives, she makes light of the incident, but her anxiety is revealed when a servant's shadow frightens her as she leaves the room. Shaken, she returns to tell her father that she has made up her mind to become a nun.

Weeks later at the Carmelite convent in Compiègne, the aged and ailing prioress Madame de Croissy interviews Blanche and makes it clear to the girl that the convent is a house of prayer, not a refuge. Nevertheless, the prioress is touched by Blanche's resolve to embrace her new life.

In the workroom of the convent, Blanche and the young Sister Constance discuss their fear of death, which Constance claims to have overcome. Blanche admits her envy of her companion's straightforward and easygoing nature. Constance shocks Blanche by telling her that she knows that they will both die young and on the same day.

In the infirmary, Madame de Croissy is lying on her deathbed, struggling to appear calm. She blesses Blanche and consigns her, as the youngest member of the order, to the care of the loyal Mother Marie. The prioress confesses her terror in the hour of death, then falls lifeless.

-INTERMISSION-

ACT II

That night in the chapel, Constance and Blanche keep vigil by the prioress's bier. Blanche is overcome by fear and is about to run off when Mother Marie appears. Realizing that Blanche is genuinely afraid, she tries to calm her. Constance hopes that Mother Marie will be the new prioress. She tells Blanche that she wonders why a Godfearing person like Madame de Croissy had to die such an agonizing death. Perhaps, she says, people don't die for themselves but for others. Someone else will be surprised one day to find death easy.

Madame Lidoine has been appointed the new prioress. In the chapter room, she addresses the convent, counseling patience and humility.

A visitor is announced—it is Blanche's brother, who is about to flee the country. He urges Blanche to leave the convent and return to their father. Blanche replies that her duty is to her sisters.

In the sacristy, the chaplain, forbidden to perform his duties, celebrates his last mass. The nuns discuss the fear that has grabbed the country, and Mother Marie wonders if self-sacrifice will be their destiny. Madame Lidoine reminds them that martyrs are not chosen by their own will, only by God's. Two commissioners enter and tell the sisters that they have been expelled from the convent. One of them, speaking quietly to Mother Marie, adds that he will do what he can to help them get away safely. One of the sisters gives Blanche a figurine of the Christ Child. When revolutionary cries are heard from outside, Blanche nervously drops the figure, breaking it. She is horrified by this omen.

ACT III

In the devastated chapel, Mother Marie suggests, in Madame Lidoine's absence, that they all take a vow of martyrdom by unanimous decision. Noting Blanche's reaction, the others suspect that she will vote against it. When the secret ballot reveals one dissenter, Constance claims it was she and asks to reverse her vote so that the vow can proceed. Blanche, afraid to live or to die, runs away. Soldiers lead the sisters from the convent.

Blanche is forced to work as a servant in the ransacked mansion of her father, who has been sent to the guillotine. Mother Marie finds her there and tries to persuade her to return to the sisters.

The nuns have been arrested. At the Conciergerie prison, Madame Lidoine joins the sisters in their vow of martyrdom. Constance says that she has dreamed of Blanche's return. A jailer enters and reads the death sentence. Madame Lidoine blesses the sisters. When Mother Marie learns from the chaplain that the nuns will die, she resolves to join them, but the chaplain reminds her that it is for God to decide whether or not she will be a martyr.

A crowd has gathered on the Place de la Révolution. The Carmelites walk toward the guillotine, led by Madame Lidoine, singing the "Salve Regina." With each stroke of the blade, their voices are silenced, one by one, finally leaving only Constance. On her way to the scaffold, she sees Blanche step up from the crowd, take up the chant, and follow her to her death.

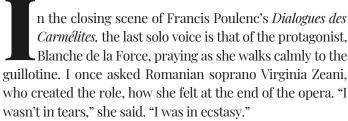

Journey of a Soul

THE PATH OF POULENC'S HEROINE FROM FEAR TO COURAGE

BY ROGER PINES



That statement speaks volumes for this incomparable work, which transports both its audience and the artists who perform it to another realm of operatic experience. At its heart is Blanche's own spiritual and emotional path, which leads ultimately to her decision to join the other Carmelites in death.

Anyone portraying Blanche faces the intimidating challenge of shaping a believable, sympathetic characterization from the character's neuroticism. The volatility of her emotions is already evident in the combination of tenderness, almost eerie distractedness, fear, and desperation that colors her behavior in the opera's first scene.

Then, once Blanche enters the Carmelite order, she encounters women who exhibit not only profound commitment to their vocation but the strength of character that she lacks.

In their different ways, the formidable Mme. de Croissy, lovable Sister Constance, zealous Mother Marie, and later Croissy's successor as prioress, warm-hearted Mme. Lidoine, all leave their mark on Blanche, Constance above all. Closest to Blanche in age, Constance hopes not only to



die young, but that she and Blanche will die together. Hearing that wish causes Blanche to lose control in an explosion of outrage. But it's another comment from Constance that gives Blanche even greater pause (and with what exquisite sweetness Poulenc sets Constance's words here, mostly in *pianissimo*): knowing of Croissy's harrowing death, Constance hints to Blanche that perhaps the prioress was dying for someone else, who would subsequently find an unexpected serenity when facing her own death.

Blanche nonetheless remains consumed not simply by fear but by what her brother calls her "fear of fear." She later tellingly describes fear as an illness; Poulenc's score indicates that this should be delivered "comme malgré elle, avec une voix presque sans timbre" ("in spite of herself, with an almost toneless voice"). In the end, fear impels Blanche to flee after the nuns' vote regarding the vow of martyrdom. Later, in her confrontation with Mother Marie, the music's hair-raising intensity makes painfully, almost unbearably vivid Blanche's paralyzing fear, as well as her shame and humiliation at now being a servant in her own house. But she transforms herself: in the final scene, when she emerges from the crowd to follow Constance to the guillotine, as the last Carmelite to die, she finds a new level of understanding and a new selflessness—indeed, a true state of grace.

Blanche is fictional, but the opera's other nuns were real: the sixteen Carmelites of Compiègne, guillotined in 1794 during the "Reign of Terror." A book by the surviving nun, Mother Marie of the Incarnation, inspired the novel by German writer Gertrud von le Fort, *Die Letzte am Schafott (The Last at the Scaffold*, 1931). This, in turn, was adapted as a play, *The Song at the Scaffold* (1949) by American writer Emmet Lavery. France's most distinguished Roman Catholic novelist of the time, Georges Bernanos, used von le Fort's book to create a screenplay, *Dialogues des Carmélites* (published posthumously as a play in 1951). Poulenc's opera premiered six years later, with both Bernanos and Lavery credited for the dramatic source from which the composer prepared his own libretto.

Poulenc's only previous opera had been a one-act farce, *Les Mamelles de Tirésias*. In recalling that uproarious work, many of Poulenc's admirers were surprised by his attraction to *Dialogues*. They forgot that he'd reaffirmed his own devotion to Catholicism in 1936, after the death of a beloved friend left him devastated. By nature, Poulenc was as tormented a human being as Blanche and was prone to extreme depression. Digging deeper into himself than in any previous work, he composed *Dialogues* in a near frenzy. The strain led to a nervous collapse and time spent in a Swiss clinic, leaving colleagues and friends wondering if the opera would ever be finished.

Poulenc wrote *Dialogues* in French, but the opera's 1957 world premiere at La Scala was performed in Italian (this was heartily approved by Poulenc, for whom audiences' thorough comprehension of his libretto was essential). Also in 1957, the opera had its first French-language performances in Paris; the U.S. premiere in English at San Francisco Opera, notable particularly for Leontyne Price's Lidoine, her first role with a major American company; and the television premiere on NBC, with Price reprising

her luminous portrayal. *Dialogues* returned to San Francisco Opera in 1963 and 1982. The latter revival earned considerable attention, thanks to a cast including three operatic legends closely associated with this work: Price (Lidoine), Zeani (Marie), and Régine Crespin, who'd sung Lidoine in the French premiere but was now Croissy.

Those great names, and many others throughout this opera's performance history, remind us that the principal roles have always attracted artists of the highest order. They've all been eminently capable of vocal virtuosity, but that ability is set aside in *Dialogues*, where it plays no role whatever. Of course, this opera needs beautiful voices, but that's not enough in *Dialogues*; the music serves a text that must be consistently projected with maximum specificity and interpretive intelligence. This becomes abundantly clear as scene after scene alternates seamlessly between utterly natural and unforced recitative, intense declamation, and lyrical arioso. A notable example is Blanche's dialogue with her brother, in which he fails to persuade her to leave the order to find safety with him outside France. Throughout this deeply affecting episode, the expressive variety of Poulenc's music—growing out of his acute responsiveness to textual nuance-stunningly reinforces Blanche's agonized conflict between resentment and tenderness.

During the final scene, when the other nuns walk to their deaths, they sing the "Salve Regina," which honors Mary, the mother of Christ. In following them, however, Poulenc's Blanche—like her counterparts in von le Fort's novel and Bernanos's play—sings instead the doxology that ends the "Veni Creator" prayer, invoking the Creator Spirit's descent. The "Salve Regina," typically sung at Compline (night prayer), is very much a farewell hymn—farewell to the day (and per-











haps life itself during the night). But in the end, the point of this story is not the final lines of the "Salve," poignant as they might be: "And after this our exile, / Show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus." It's a petition, a supplication, a request. In contrast, "Veni Creator," typically sung at anointings with oil (hence consecrations of created beings), represents not merely a song of glorification and praise to the power of God but a song of *trust* at the horrific moment in which most of us would only see the utter powerlessness of God.

Blanche's journey and the glories of Poulenc's music that support it make *Dialogues des Carmélites* a life-changing work. Open yourself to it and you'll emerge from the performance with a totally new understanding of the emotional and spiritual power that opera can offer.

e in the Bay Area live in one of the least religious regions of the United States (and the world, for that matter). Well over 90% of us don't attend church, mosque, synagogue, or temple regularly. And if we look at people in the under-30 category, that percentage of non-participation in religion goes even higher. Given who we are, what does *Dialogues of the Carmelites*, an opera about the deaths of a group of Roman Catholic nuns in late 18th-century France, have to say to us? I believe this important opera continues to direct our hearts towards love and sacrifice, as it did when first created, and has expanded to reflect our world today—one we know as deeply interconnected and still with need for the miraculous. This commentary explores the dynamic, wherein the Beloved Community is healed through love.

The religious landscape of the 1950s was far different, even in San Francisco, than it is today. When *Dialogues of the Carmelites* had its U.S. premiere in 1957, you could still use religious terms like "Main Line Christians" and it would have some currency in conversation. Religious language and practice cropped up in schools and other formally secular spaces with regularity.

The cultural shock waves of the 1960s, however, were just around the corner. Georges Bernanos, who wrote the play on which the libretto for *Dialogues* is based, may have been anticipating these upsets, with doomed nuns standing in for a whole religious and cultural complex that would be changed almost beyond recognition in the years and decades to come.

The content of *Dialogues of the Carmelites* is essentially theological and spiritual and expressive of a religion-steeped culture that was passing. Within that mid-century religious structure, fading as it was, were two potent realities that have grown and evolved since then: The idea of a world interconnected by love (then called the Communion of Saints), and a path for healing wounded souls by means of sacrifice for the other.

While both spiritual concepts are expressed in *Dialogues* in terms of strict Christian doctrine, they can now be seen in a broader context. The Communion of Saints has evolved to a new incarnation as the Beloved Community—a community that embraces all of life, not only the saints of the Catholic Church. Awakened hearts within the Beloved Community have the power to heal by

the offering of their own life force for the sake of the wounded; not only can saintly nuns mystically heal the fearful and broken, all have this capability.

The Communion of Saints at the time of *Dialogues* was likened to a body, all the parts connected to all others. The breath and blood of this sacred and immense body was a particular kind of love: *agape*, a Greek word that is often translated as "unconditional love," "sacrificial love," or, as I translate it, "overflowing love." *Agape* love is now seen to be a universal, a cosmic force, at work everywhere, and with everyone.

The second spiritual concept found in *Dialogues* is even more striking and more fearsome than that of the Beloved Community. While I might wish to be a healer, if I have even a glimmer of awareness, I see that healing isn't something objective but is costly, requiring an outpouring of my love, my life. *Dialogues* presents this idea through the figures of two nuns, one historical and one fictional. The fictional sister, Blanche de la Force, is presented as a timid person, who hopes to escape the Terror in Revolutionary France by taking refuge in the Carmelite convent. To our surprise, however, Blanche goes to her death calmly, courageously, full of faith.

The Mother Superior, Mme de Croissy, a historical figure, is almost the opposite character from that of the novice

Blanche. The Mother Superior is self-assured and grounded; she is a leader to be looked to and trusted. Yet, contrary to our expectations, she goes to her death racked with fear. What has happened to account for these surprising reversals? Bernanos, suggests a bold spiritual equation: The Mother Superior has already died Blanche's death. Or, put another way, she has taken on Blanche's fear, healed her of this fear so that Blanche could die a good death.

While not taking away from the cost that self-sacrifice entails, it is crucial to say that loss and pain do not have the last word. *Agape* may be best understood as not only sacrificial love but overflowing love because this kind of love originates in the Divine and pours forth eternally from the Divine. As St. Paul wrote in his *Letter to the Corinthians*, "Love never ends."

Dialogues was not the first work of fiction to articulate this bold idea of healing by sacrificial substitution. Almost a decade before, Charles Williams—a fairly obscure editor of Oxford University Press—began to explore the idea of substitutionary love in a series of highly imaginative fantasy novels. Williams was part of a group of writers that came to be known as "The Inklings," which included C.S. Lewis, author of the Narnia series, and J.R.R. Tolkien, author of *The Hobbit* and *The Lord of the Rings*.

In Williams' hands, substitutionary love is already not the property of any one faith or religion. In the novel

THE BELOVED COMMUNITY

The Beloved Community is a community not only in which all are included and all are at peace with one another but also in which each being is connected to every other being. For Martin Luther King, Jr. (MLK), it meant that each part of the whole itself suffers when even the smallest, seemingly most insignificant part suffers:

"We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly affects all indirectly."

"But the end is reconciliation; the end is redemption; the end is the creation of the beloved community. It is this type of spirit and this type of love that can transform opposers into friends. The type of love that I stress here is not *eros*, a sort of esthetic or romantic love; not *philia*, a sort of reciprocal love between personal friends; but it is *agape* which is understanding goodwill for all men. It is an overflowing love which seeks nothing in return. It is the love of God working in the lives of men. This is the love that may well be the salvation of our civilization."

Descent into Hell, Pauline is a modern young woman, not particularly religious with respect to external practices, but a person with a purity of heart and a disposition towards compassion. Her sacrificial, overflowing love works to ease the death of one of her ancestors, who died a fiery martyr's death hundreds of years before Pauline's time.

That *agape* love has the power to heal across time and space may seem a dubious concept. Clergyman and activist A.J. Muste, who put his life on the line many times during protests for workers in the early 20th century, witnessed to the power of *agape* in this way:

If the ultimate expression of violence is killing the opponent, the 'aggressor,' the ultimate expression of nonviolence or soul force is quite as obviously the willingness and ability to die ... on behalf of another. The pacifist must be ready to pay that price ... The suffering need not be sought. Indeed it must not be. Martyrdom for the sake of martyrdom is suicide by exhibitionism, not redemptive [sacrifice]. But we may not seek to evade suffering. It must be voluntarily accepted. The model for accepting such sacrifice is passion and death ... Then God has entered into history and its course has been forever changed. Here is released the power which in the political and social realm is the counterpart of the fission of the atom and the release of atomic energy in its realm [emphasis mine].

Dialogues has an urgent message for us today, a message that takes the two themes of the Communion of Saints (the Beloved Community) and substitutionary love as they have been transformed in the decades since the San

Francisco premiere, and offers them to us, to apply to wounds of the world and of our own lives.

Healing and being healed is vividly before us today. We witness healthcare providers working tirelessly in COVID wards before vaccines afforded protection, firefighters literally jumping ahead of flames, and countless voices calling for change when those on the margins become scapegoats—all these are moments of choice when we can be agents of compassion or recipients of healing, drawing on overflowing love. It is likely that most of these courageous people don't consciously intend to be healers, and almost certainly they don't imagine that they might be agents of spiritual transformation as presented in *Dialogues* and *Descent into Hell*, yet the opera has shown us that the possibility is there.

There are so many reasons to attend the opera. One reason is to nurture our own imaginations, to expand our own sense of what is possible. Let me close with this quotation attributed to Samuel Taylor Coleridge: "What if you slept, and what if in your sleep you dreamed, and what if in your dream you went to heaven, and there plucked a strange and beautiful flower, and what if, when you awoke, you had that flower in your hand? Ay, what then?"

Let me suggest that two flowers we might pick from the heavenly garden that is *Dialogues of the Carmelites* are an understanding of the Beloved Community, the community of all life held together by overflowing love, and the possibility of healing within the world by means of our willingness to accept the burdens of others. When we leave the opera, carrying these flowers, "Ay, what then?"

Lighting Design Edition



San Francisco Opera's resident lighting director since 2018, Justin A. Partier, interviewed legendary lighting designer Tom Munn last May, a few weeks before Munn's passing after a long battle with cancer. Munn was the Company's lighting designer from 1976 until 2001, returned as a guest designer, and was named emeritus lighting designer. The two shared stories and shed light on how lighting designers approach tricky productions to create brilliant effects and unforgettable stage pictures. Justin Partier: Tom, it's great to have you here! How did you first get into theater and opera and lighting as a whole? Where did you start?

Tom Munn: I got interested in lighting in high school back in Connecticut. We had a regular theater with a fly loft and lighting positions. The major manufacturing in town was General Electric, and they were making dimmers at that time. They put in a big auto transformer board with all the interlocking mechanisms and whatnot, so I got interested in that and decided I wanted to pursue it in college. My parents were not so excited about me going into a theater program initially. They wanted me to get a "general education," so I started at St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vermont. I chose that mainly because I was a skier. (laughter)

JP: That's a good excuse, right?

TM: I managed to get on the ski team and got a free pass to Stowe, Vermont for the season. I practically failed my first year of college because I was on the slopes the whole time! (laughter) I did Summer Stock and transferred to Boston University as a result and then studied at BU with some greats at the time: [costume designer] Horace Armistead, [theater designer] Raymond Sovey, and various people from New York. BU didn't have a lighting design program, per se, which was a benefit to me because I got to light everything! I got to sort of pick and choose shows that I wanted to do.

JP: It's a little trial by fire, 'cause you're a kid learning how to light shows. You get to make the mistakes, right?

TM: Yeah. And then I basically supported myself scene painting and finally got a break and did a couple of off-

Broadway and dance shows in New York and then did a couple of Broadway shows. None of them succeeded. (laughter) I got a lot of furniture for my apartment, because every time a show closed they would say, "Come take what you want!"

JP: So how did you get from that to San Francisco?

TM: I was doing a lot of industrial shows [and Master Electrician] George Pantages recommended me to come to the Opera. I interviewed with [then San Francisco Opera General Director] Kurt Adler and with several people and got the job. I thought it was crazy. (laughs) I mean, I'd only done two operas.

JP: I tell this story about my first opera, growing up in San Francisco and New York. My first opera was *La Bohème*, I think it was '93, and walking in and seeing this grandiose set I'd done small theater in high school and college. Seeing that totally changes your perspective of what you can do scenically and [with] lighting to really improve upon the art form, you know? I just remember sitting there being completely in awe that you can turn on one light and completely change the way the set looks. That blew my mind.

TM: Or from what direction.

JP: What direction, or what color, or if it somehow skims scenery in a beautiful way to do a sunrise.

Going back to your first season, there was one show in particular that sort of stuck out, which was the *Thaïs* [1976, the Company premiere of Massenet's opera]. Can you tell me about that?

TM: It was the first show that I was doing from scratch here—by that I mean that I was actually involved from the conception. It was a really challenging design because it was a surround of mirrors that were motorized and articulated and could change position. It had two amoeba-shaped platforms and they could change position onstage. Each one could rotate individually, or they could interlock and become one unit. Well, it all had to be done by hand (they were not computerized at that point), and we finally gave up with moving them *a vista* in front of the audience, and we did them at scene changes. It was really tricky.

Not only that but the director wanted the lighting isolated to the platforms. Well, if the platforms are constantly moving, and you don't have moving lights (laughter) and he says, "No, no, it's gotta be three feet to the left" ...

JP: Then all of a sudden you have to refocus. (laughter)

TM: ... and you know you haven't got the time to refocus!

JP: Right.

TM: The other thing was bouncing the light off the mirrors. I found that because I had limited space to put equipment between the mirrors and they were always moving, the mirrors were the one thing that was actually getting in the same position all the time. So I could just bounce a light off a mirror! There was a scene that had a huge mirror over the bed, and this was completely boxed in with mirrors around the whole stage, and the bed is raised off the floor (laughter) and she's sitting back in the bed. I said there's no way ... and I tried everything to get light in. Finally I just resorted to the balcony rail. And it was fine!

JP: Sometimes the artistry is there, and you just have to embrace the things that may not be the right logical way to get there, but you get there. And, you can, as an artist, step back and say, "Oh, look at this great thing that I've discovered. I'm going to put that in my brain for the next time I have to do a show with a mirror!"

TM: Right. (laughter) What [show sticks out for you] so far?

JP: The *Fidelio* we just did [October 2021]. A big rotating set with mirrors on it is a very challenging show, on top of the storytelling being very challenging. I was the codesigner with JAX Messenger. He couldn't be here, so I ended up lighting. And it was ...

TM: And it was spectacular. It really was.

JP: Oh, thank you. It was really hard. (laughs) I had never done a show with mirrors as a designer. I'd done it as an assistant, but I'd never done it as a designer, and in that first act, the curtain goes up and you can see everyone, but how do you light it? We didn't want light to hit the mirrors. We wanted to keep all the light off of it and still use follow spots. It looked beautiful, but getting there ...!

TM: I think my biggest challenge was *William Tell* on a raked floor that had mirrors running up and downstage, against a projection screen. I finally convinced them to cut holes in the mirrors at the bottom so I could get some kind of side lighting in.

JP: I see a theme happening: challenges with mirrors! (laughter)

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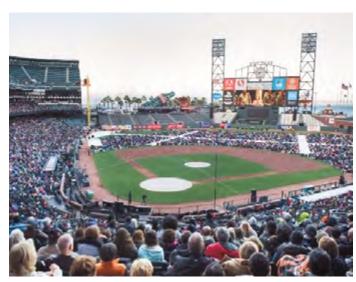
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On Glimpsing the Sublime

n June this year, our group of Instigators gathered in person for the very first time. This is a group of six creative visionaries from outside the world of opera, working with us to envision new directions for the artform. We posed the question of "what defines opera?" and the conversation turned to the "sublime." I've thought about this word a great deal since that conversation and opera's ability to take us beyond our

rational, measured understanding of the world. How often have we felt that opera takes us to states of mind otherwise out of reach? The multisensory nature of this artform can result in a transmigration out of reality in which we get to glimpse the sublime.

The sublime is a state much more complex than beauty or joy; in fact, the 18th century philosopher Edmund Burke talked of terror being a source of the sublime, and in this we come to the sublime in *Dialogues of the Carmelites*. Poulenc has an extraordinary ability to take his characters, and us by extension, to places beyond ourselves. We see the sublime through the lens of terror at the end of Act I when the Prioress dies a tortured death, one so

terrible that Sister Constance believes her death was meant for someone else. And we see the sublime at the end of the opera where the community of nuns goes to the guillotine, resolved in sorority to confront the fear of death. The Prioress' death is one of anguish, the other deaths are of religious affirmation, but in both we glimpse the spiritual sublime.

I am reminded of other examples of the spiritual sublime in opera, including one seen on our stage twenty years ago with Messiaen's *Saint François d'Assise*. At the start of the opera, Saint Francis makes clear that a perfect

joy will result from enduring all suffering (visit our *Streaming the First Century* website to listen to excerpts). The second is Kaija Saariaho's *L'amour de loin* in which a pilgrim tires of the hedonism of life and yearns for an idealized love. The third is Wagner's *Parsifal* in which the grace of Parsifal's wisdom finally releases the perpetual terror of Amfortas' pain.

In each of these operas we glimpse the

sublime through a lens of spiritual ecstasy (as opposed to erotic ecstasy in a work like Wagner's *Tristan and Isolde*), each composer—Messiaen, Saariaho, Wagner—quite literally torquing time to allow us access to something beyond the rational. In *Dialogues of the Carmelites*, Poulenc does this with an exquisite purposefulness, voices hovering over

both intimate and spacious at the same time. Reflecting on the sublime, Burke wrote that "When danger or pain

terrible; but at certain distances, and with certain modifications, they may be, and they are, delightful, as we every day experience." In Poulenc's musical spaciousness, he gives us that distance in which to engage with the complex intersection of fear, faith, and resolve. There is maybe no greater exemplar of the sublime rendered in music than the final scene of *Dialogues of the Carmelites* in which the terror of death, punctuated by the jarring blade of the guillotine, opens up into a sublimity of grace. We hold both states of terror and grace in unity and in doing so we glimpse the sublime.

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
