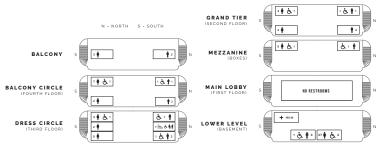

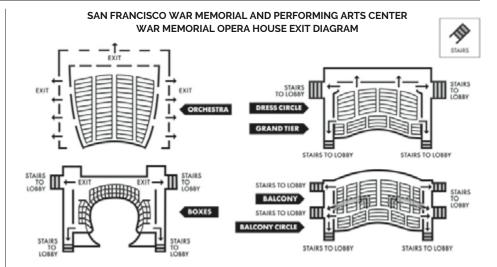

Kurt Herbert Adler presented *Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk* starring **Anja Silja** (center) as the centerpiece of his 28th and final season in 1981 as general director of San Francisco Opera. He entrusted the baton to his protégé **Calvin Simmons**, a versatile musician and rising star in the classical music world. One year after leading this incisive performance, Simmons died in a tragic boating accident. He was 32.

In addition to their support of San Francisco Opera, the Gunns are active members of the community. John is a former trustee of Stanford University and is Chairman Emeritus of the Advisory Board for the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research. Cynthia currently serves as a trustee of the Fine Arts Museums and is a former overseer of Stanford's Hoover Institution and has been a member of the advisory board of Family and Children Services and the board of the Lucile Packard Foundation for Children's Health. Bertie Bialek Elliott (Production Sponsor, Antony and Cleopatra)

Roberta "Bertie" Bialek Elliott has a long history of volunteerism and philanthropic support on the Monterey Peninsula, in the Bay Area, and at her alma mater Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. Bertie was born in Omaha, Nebraska and graduated from Northwestern in 1954 with a degree in History and Phi Beta Kappa honors. In 1963 she and her then-husband moved to Carmel, California to raise their family. Bertie was an early investor in Berkshire Hathaway, founded by her brother, legendary investor Warren Buffett. Bertie and her three daughters established the Berkshire Foundation in 1996 and have supported many organizations and institutions through it. Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula. Most recently Bertie helped the Community Hospital in establishing the Ohana Center for Child and Adolescent Behavioral Health. Bertie has supported the San Francisco Opera for more than 20 years and is a big fan of John Adams. Bertie sponsored his *Girls of the Golden West* in 2017 and was a commissioning sponsor of *Doctor Atomic* in 2005.

Jerome L. & Thao N. Dodson (Production Sponsor, Eugene Onegin)

"A fiery horse with the speed of light, a cloud of dust and a hearty, Hi-Yo, Silver!" Those words, accompanied by the galloping excitement of Rossini's *William Tell* Overture, transfixed a young Jerry Dodson as he listened to *The Lone Ranger* on the family radio in Oak Park, Illinois. Just as Bugs Bunny's *Rabbit of Seville* had done for many, a lighthearted entertainment sparked a future operatic devotion. That little boy grew up to attend Berkeley in the '60s, serve with the American Embassy in Vietnam where he and Thao met, and attend Harvard Business School. Eventually, the couple married, settled in the Bay Area, and raised a family. In the 1980s, Jerry was a pioneer in the field of socially responsible investing, with little interest in opera. But in 1992, when San Francisco Opera

decided to celebrate Rossini's bicentennial with the rarely performed *William Tell*, Thao, already an opera lover, suggested to Jerry that they go. *William Tell* was praised for its striking Lotfi Mansouri production, and the Dodsons began attending regularly. They became season ticket holders in 1999 and supporters, "in a small way," as Jerry puts it. A friendship with David Gockley, which endures to this day, led to a larger role as Company Sponsors. "I so admired what he did for the opera, but it was not very good for my pocketbook," Jerry laughs. Jerry also lends his financial expertise to the audit committee. In 2016, Dodson considered the import of Gockley's departure. He met with Matthew Shilvock and joined the Board that year. "We hit it off right away!" Jerry says. He felt a similar affinity with Keith Geeslin (President of the San Francisco Opera Association). Eager to continue their support, the Dodsons see the Centennial Season as a perfect time to revitalize and energize the Company within the San Francisco community. The initial fire ignited by *William Tell* continues to burn brightly.

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Bob Ellis (Production Sponsor, Antony and Cleopatra)

Bob has been a longtime supporter of contemporary opera since he became a member of the board of directors in 2001. He has supported all of John Adams' new productions for SFO, beginning with the commission of *Doctor Atomic* in 2005, *Girls of the Golden West* in 2017, and now Antony and Cleopatra. "For me, John Adams has a unique gift for creating operatic portraits of major historical moments, with pulsing, lyrical singing and orchestration that keeps them alive in my memory." 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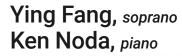

pera is an art form that tries to build towards the sublime," reflected writer-director **Samantha Gorman** during the opening session of the Instigators last June, when six remarkable thinkers and artists eagerly accepted San Francisco Opera's invitation to dive headlong into the world of opera, kicking off the Company's bold multidisciplinary program to help pioneer future directions for the field. Exploring new ground is something Gorman and her LA-based studio, TenderClaws, seek to do in immersive spaces and emerging media including AR [augmented reality] and VR [virtual reality], often with live performers.

This rumination—on the beauty and power of opera, how and what the art form traditionally has been and for whom, and what it might yet become—was part of an expansive, lively conversation that unfurled over five days of immersive introductory activities hosted by San Francisco Opera for the Instigators. In addition to field trips to the Company's scenic and costume shops and to the Institute of the Future in Palo Alto, the Instigators met with luminaries such as director Peter Sellars, composer Jake Heggie, librettist Roxie Perkins, and animation-VR creator Saschka Unseld. Exchanging ideas with a range of Company artists, artisans, and staff, they took part in hands-on activities around the Opera House and attended rehearsals and performances. It is all part of the San Francisco Opera's collective effort, with support from the Creative Edge Fund, to tap creative leaders from a range of disciplines to infuse the Company, the art form, and the community with unexpected ideas.

Jad Abumrad, the storyteller-musician-journalist whose

groundbreaking podcasts include *Radiolab*, mused on the interplay between power and scale: "You can have the smallest story, but as soon as it's on a stage and it's set to music, you feel like these people are 30 feet tall. Audio [storytelling] is very much about intimacy and about a one-to-one connection ... is there a way that something can be operatic and also as intimate as a podcast?"

For architect, designer, and software engineer **Peter Zuspan**, whose firm, Bureau V, designs performance spaces and engages in artist collaborations, bigness is one of the things that draws him to opera (which he studied as a singer): "Just the scale of it is so important. That part is a really important thing for me, as a designer thinking about space all the time."

Open-ended inquiry is at the heart of this new initiative, notes San Francisco Opera General Director **Matthew Shilvock**. "There's this willingness in the Bay Area to tread into unknown territory and see exciting things result, of pushing boundaries and being willing to do the unthinkable," he told the Instigators. "I've long wished that we as a cultural organization could embody more of that sensibility. Because of where we are in the world, we should be able to tap into that mindset in a way that really nobody else can—unencumbered by the reality of the traditional side of what we do, without a fixed end goal."

The initiative supports one- or two-year inquiries in a lab-like framework. With goalposts a fluid concept, the Instigators' inquiry may take many forms, from research and experiments to workshops and prototypes, drawing upon expertise and partnerships with people from inside and outside the field of opera.

East Bay chef, educator, and author **Bryant Terry** has long admired how opera brings together so many different

genres but wondered about the role of the audience: "In a lot of European art forms, the norm is that as a viewer, you're a very passive recipient. But in a lot of diasporic Black cultures, there's this norm of interacting with the performance: you're giving them energy, they're giving you energy. And so there's this kind of dialogue and interplay."

Interplay and participation have always deeply informed the work of writer-scenographer-director **Abhishek Majumdar**, artistic director of Bangalore's Nalanda Arts Studio. Referencing Asian forms such as Jatra, Lhamo opera, and Bengali opera, he asked, "How does [opera] connect to your life outside? And what's the connection between that life and this life? Do you find your stories, and does this inform your life?"

Design technologist-researcher **Paula Te**, who explores how the design of interfaces and interactions can augment human learning and enable creative expression, inquired, "How can opera be something that's more than a consumptive experience and feel more like something we're participating in? What might it look like if audience members felt like their lived experiences were reflected in opera?"

As the Instigators—abetted by the Company's Director of Innovation Programs Lee Helms, Instigators Curator Elena Park, and Creative Advisor Jocelyn Clarke—begin to tackle these and many more questions, they'll help to dream a future for opera that we can only begin to imagine.

THE FUTURE OF OPERA

Eugene Onegin

ACT I

SCENE 1: Madame Larina and the old nurse Filipyevna are making fruit preserves. Inside the house, the Larin daughters, Tatyana and Olga, are singing a ballad. Peasants arrive with a decorated wheat sheaf. Tatyana daydreams to their folk tune, but it makes Olga want to dance. Tatyana continues reading a romantic novel and, when her mother reminds her there are no heroes in real life, she attributes her sad looks to the events of the story. Olga's fiancé, Lensky, arrives with Onegin, a friend from St. Petersburg. Onegin is surprised that Lensky has chosen the superficial Olga for a wife and turns his attention to the more enigmatic Tatyana. Tatyana, for her part, sees Onegin as the man of her dreams. Onegin is condescending about country life but has deeply impressed Tatyana.

SCENE 2: Filipyevna is helping Tatyana prepare for bed. Tatyana begs for stories of Filipyevna's youth, before confessing that she has fallen in love. When the nurse leaves, Tatyana pours out her feelings in a passionate letter to Onegin, declaring eternal love. Dawn is breaking as Tatyana finishes her letter, and Filipyevna is startled to find her awake. Tatyana gives her the letter to deliver to Onegin.

SCENE 3: Peasants sing as they work in the Larin garden. Tatyana enters, agitated, at the prospect of a visit by Onegin. When he arrives, he acknowledges receiving her letter and explains kindly but patronizingly that he was touched by it and admired its candor. But he adds that he has no intention of marrying. He could not conceivably be her lover and can offer no more than brotherly affection.

-INTERMISSION-

ACT II

SCENE 1: At Tatyana's birthday ball, Onegin dances with her but is bored. Hearing the guests gossip about his relationship to Tatyana, he dances with Olga to provoke Lensky. Lensky feels betrayed by Onegin's flirtation with Olga. When Onegin laughingly persists in dancing with Olga, Lensky's jealousy flares. Lensky challenges Onegin to a duel, and Onegin realizes he has gone too far.

SCENE 2: Lensky gloomily awaits his opponent and broods over his love for Olga. Onegin arrives. Both regret their quarrel, but the conventions of the duel bind them to their commitment. Lensky is killed.

ACT III

SCENE 1: Onegin, just back from lengthy travels abroad, arrives at a magnificent ball in St. Petersburg but is unhappy and remorseful. The death of Lensky lies heavy on his heart. The glittering ball seems to symbolize the emptiness and aimlessness of his life. Prince Gremin, a retired general, arrives with his wife. Onegin, with shock and bewilderment, recognizes the Princess Gremina as Tatyana—a vision of dignity and grace. The Prince tells him he married Tatyana two years ago and that his life has been transformed and redeemed by the love of this beautiful woman. When introduced, Tatyana and Onegin are formal with each other. Onegin is distressed to realize he has fallen inopportunely but deeply in love with her.

SCENE 2: Tatyana, profoundly unsettled by the passionate love letter Onegin sent her, awaits him. Onegin arrives and falls at her feet. She reminds him that he once rejected her and tells him that, because of her marriage, and despite her love for him, she will not yield to him now. It is her clear duty to leave him immediately and forever. Onegin is left alone in misery and despair.

An Intimate Grandeur

IN EUGENE ONEGIN, TCHAIKOVSKY OUTLINES LOVE'S DEMANDS



rtists are often poor critics of their own work, so Tchaikovsky can be excused for failing to recognize he had made a masterpiece in *Eugene Onegin*. Perhaps the circumstances of its birth colored his judgment. Finely built, powerfully communicative, filled with some of the composer's most rapturous music, nothing about this opera suggests it emerged from the worst episode of his life.

Being gay at a time and in a society uneasy with sex in any form, Tchaikovsky was tortured with guilt and fear of being outed—so tortured and so scared that, in 1877, he determined at last to undergo a self-imposed conversion therapy. He planned to marry.

This plan, his biographer David Brown believes, enabled Tchaikovsky to convince himself he could build a solid domestic life, and because no specific bride existed, the project could remain a fantasy. In May 1877, everything changed. A letter arrived from a woman who claimed to have loved Tchaikovsky since her student days at the Moscow Conservatory, where he taught. Her name

had fallen in love with Pushkin's Tatyana. Disgusted with Onegin for lecturing her after she had poured out her heart, he determined not to repeat the mistake.

And so he met with Antonina. Yet his presumed wish to be kind seems more pretext than reason to have made contact with her, for here was a woman who suddenly offered a way to end his bachelorhood. After a second meeting with Antonina, he proposed.

Antonina was no Tatyana. Tchaikovsky told his bride that while she might have his companionship, she would never enjoy his love, an admission that failed to faze her. Predictably, the union of two such troubled and clueless souls disintegrated, and after a few months they each went their way. Tchaikovsky, though miserable and close to nervous breakdown, recovered quickly and returned to *Onegin*, immersing himself in a world that nurtured him, replacing what reality had drained. The parallels between *Onegin* and Tchaikovsky's life beg attention if only to grasp a sense of the inner forces he harnessed as he produced his greatest stage work. *Eugene Onegin* simmers

was Antonina Ivanovna Milyukova. Although Tchaikovsky surely knew Pushkin's verse-novel *Eugene Onegin*—any educated Russian did—he had not yet considered an *Onegin* project of his own, and he may not have realized his response to Antonina echoed Onegin's response to the letter in which Tatyana declares her love. Both men, the real and the fictional, counseled the women to get a grip.

Then a friend suggested Pushkin's novel as a basis for an opera. Tchaikovsky scoffed. So complex a book would never translate to the stage. Yet over a solitary dinner at an inn, the idea gelled, and by the time Tchaikovsky headed home a scenario materialized. Soon he was working at top speed. But fate, a subject he had dramatized in his recently completed Fourth Symphony, had a way of confounding him. Now it came in the form of another letter from Antonina. "My first kiss will be given to you and to no one else in the world," she wrote. "I cannot live without you, and so maybe soon I shall kill myself If you knew how I suffer, then probably out of pity alone you would grant my request." By now Tchaikovsky

with what we call "operatic" passions. Its world is dominated by Tatyana, an ideal Tchaikovsky discovered by way of Alexander Sergeyevich Pushkin.

Published in its final version in 1837, Pushkin's versenovel Eugene Onegin differs from Tchaikovsky's opera in scope and tone, its pages packed with what musicologist Richard Taruskin calls "verbal dazzle" and "wry social commentary." By Tchaikovsky's time, writes Taruskin, the novel had become "sacrosanct." From this, Tchaikovsky fashioned his libretto, enlisting the help of his friend Konstantin Shilovsky. Though the librettists adopted much of Pushkin's phrasing, they ignored the sarcasms and digressions and narrative twists. What remains is straightforward: Pushkin bowdlerized, some believed— Turgenev and Nabakov among them-dismayed that a sacrosanct text had been cut and pasted into a sentimental romance. From Pushkin, Tchaikovsky took what he needed to feed his muse and help sort the emotions roiled by his time with Antonina.

He moved fast, starting in June 1877 and completing *Onegin* the following February 1. He believed he had made something different, not a grandly scaled opera but a collection of "lyric scenes" capturing the essence of Pushkin's story. "There are no scenic effects," he wrote to his patroness Nadezhda von Meck, "its music is devoid of brilliance and high-flown effectiveness." His ideal audience would be eager for "the musical reproduction of ordinary, simple, universal sensations far removed from high tragedy and theatricality." Tchaikovsky denied the premiere to the imperial theaters of Saint Petersburg and Moscow, wary their conventional staging would threaten the freshness of his new work. The first performance, by students and faculty of the Moscow Conservatory, took place on March 29, 1879. Tchaikovsky expected little from public or press, but both embraced the opera despite grumbling from the Pushkinites. One critic predicted it would become among the Russian repertory's most popular entries.

While Tchaikovsky claimed not to have written on an opulent scale, no one can accuse *Onegin* of lacking

Four show-stopping numbers celebrate love; and if we fail to recognize love as their subject, musical correspondences make the likeness clear. In scene 1 of the first act, Lensky serenades Olga in an aria of spontaneous melody, cresting in a passage of proto-Puccini, as drenched in joy as the music of Tatyana's letter scene will be saturated with blissful despair. To underscore the kinship of the emotions we encounter in Lensky's serenade and in the letter scene, we hear shrewdly related foreshadowings in the orchestra: a variant of the horn figure that will dominate the letter scene, for example. That phrase recurs in Act 2 in the minor-key counterpart to Lensky's serenade, his lament before his duel with Onegin. And as Lensky takes his weapon, the orchestra offers a poignant reminder of the serenade's opening phrase. In the happier climate of Act 1, Lensky moves into even higher emotional gear in his love song's peroration, concluding as the letter scene concludes, when Tatyana pens her last lines and the orchestra parallels Lensky's gesture, erupting in a musical equivalent of ecstasy.

grandeur, which infuses even the first-act peasants' chorus and dance, the second-act waltz and mazurka, the third-act polonaise. In them and throughout, we hear signature Tchaikovsky, the Tchaikovsky who wrings every ounce of color and weight from a standard orchestral complement.

Onegin's real grandeur, however, is subtle and intimate. It celebrates human dignity, a quality emerging from the music that drapes Tchaikovsky's characters, namely those whose lives have been blemished by the callous Onegin. This is a tale of how *eros* plus *caritas* completes love's equation, how a commitment to cherish the other physically requires an equal devotion to the spirit. Alone among the principals, Onegin suffers a stunted sensibility. Compared to what Tchaikovsky gives Tatyana, Lensky, and Gremin, who rejoice in love, Onegin's music remains emotionally cool, igniting only when Lensky challenges his honor and when the loss of Tatyana triggers his passion, selfish though that passion remains.

Such ecstasy is echoed in Prince Gremin's Act 3 aria—echoed literally in melodic shape, except now accompanied by an orchestra of chamber-like proportions and proceeding at a more measured pace. As Tatyana's husband rhapsodizes, the music mirroring that of the letter scene, we understand that Gremin's passion for his wife still smolders with the heat of young love, a point emphasized when he ends exactly as Lensky finished his serenade to Olga, Gremin singing "she appeared like a ray of sunlight, bringing me life and youth and happiness" to the same music in which Lensky pledged, "Never shall anything quench my love." The match underscores the fusion of *eros* and *caritas*. Small wonder that Tatyana refuses to relinquish such a life.

The opera's nucleus occurs some forty minutes into the work's two-and-a-half-hours. This is no dramatic miscalculation. The letter scene seals our pact with Tatyana, so much so that Onegin will never succeed in gaining our sympathy. This is the heroine's show, and if

the opera is not titled *Tatyana Larina*, it is because Tchaikovsky understood his limits in reshaping Pushkin.

The letter scene's music reveals both Tatyana's vulnerability and her passion. Crucial here is the haunting orchestral passage that introduces the scene's last section (immediately before Tatvana asks, "Are vou my guardian angel, or my tempter?"). The pace slackens, the key shifts into the quiet rapture of D-flat major, and the oboe poses a question, phrased as a group of three descending tones plus five more (eight tones in all, dropping from a high F to A-flat). The first horn answers with a group of three tones plus four (seven tones in all, rising and falling from a low F to another A-flat). Tchaikovsky requests that this dreamy two-part passage be played piano, andante, and molto espressivo. When Tatyana breaks off to finish writing, the dreamy passage returns but now *fortissimo* in the full orchestra, and what was initially fragile becomes music of powerful resolve. But return to that introduction, the questioning oboe and answering horn. We have heard each phrase earlier, not always literally the same as these but alike in shape and mood. Never, however, have we heard both phrases together. Combined at last, the two phrases become one passage; hearing it whole after being exposed until now only to suggestions of its constituent parts, we experience a deep sense of completion. It is a stroke that transforms the letter scene from music to miracle.

Tchaikovsky deals with Onegin roughly, forcing him to endure the consequences of bad choosing, consequences the composer well understood. This is not the sentimental tale of lost love Turgenev and Nabakov condemned. Pushkin's Onegin is spurned after appealing to Tatvana by letter. Tchaikovsky accomplishes this irony musically, for when in Act 3 Onegin claims to be poisoned with desire for Tatyana, his music corresponds to hers as the letter scene began, and so do his words: he even appropriates her emotions. Encountering the older and wiser Tatyana, Onegin regrets dismissing her years earlier. Not, however, because he broke her heart, but because his cruelty has cost him a desirable woman—a princess! In his arrogance, he imagines the naïve girl whose spirit he crushed would have become the same woman, had she been at his side, and now, despite what once passed between them, he believes himself entitled to ask that she abandon the husband who adores her. Onegin has eluded wisdom. He has grown desperate, surely, but no less self-absorbed.

Our patience with this man, like Tatyana's, is at an end. We can imagine ourselves walking off the stage with her, leaving Onegin alone as the final curtain falls.

A UKRAINIAN PERSPECTIVE ON EUGENE ONEGIN

he opera you are about to see is typically described as a story with timeless themes of longing, regret, and unrequited love. Tatyana's letter scene burns with passion. The final duet laments the loss of a love that could never be. Embedded within *Eugene Onegin*, however, is another story: one of yearning and a relationship not between individuals but social groups; one fraught with pain and violence.

The words in the title above are not, as you might expect, those of Tatyana but of the "peasants" in the opening chorus: servants who in Tchaikovsky's day would have been identified by his audience as serfs. Just as the plot of this opera is about those who win and those who lose, the story of *Eugene Onegin*'s success on the international operatic stage includes the message that those who attain fame and fortune often do so at the cost of others.

In 1891, 12 years after the Moscow premiere of *Onegin*, Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840-1893) visited his contemporary, the composer Mykola Lysenko (1842–1912), at his home on Reitarska Street, a stone's throw from the glittering onion domes of St. Sophia's Cathedral in Kyiv. Tchaikovsky and Lysenko had been friendly since at least 1875, when the latter had organized a series of concerts in St. Petersburg—the seat of Russian imperial power showcasing Ukrainian vernacular music. In the imperial lexicon of the time, this would have been referred to as "Little Russian" music, a term obviously considered demeaning by Ukrainians. These 1875 concerts were revelatory for Tchaikovsky, whose heritage was part-Ukrainian, and who had previously integrated Ukrainian folk motifs into his Symphony No. 2 in C minor. Tchaikovsky also admired Lysenko's own compositions. (The latter's 1885 choral work "Prayer for Ukraine" would go on to become a spiritual anthem of Ukraine. It was performed on Saturday Night Live days after the current Russian full-scale invasion of Ukraine began and by the San Francisco Symphony Chorus a few months later).

Lysenko and Tchaikovsky, born two years apart, both traced their lineage to proto-Ukrainian Cossack warriors who had, for centuries, battled against Russian and other empires seeking to dominate the territory of Ukraine. Tchaikovsky is the Russified surname of a family that had, over generations, assimilated into the Russian imperial elite—the family's original surname was "Chaika" (meaning "seagull"). Lysenko, meanwhile, had dedicated himself to Ukrainian causes: as an ethnographer, he pioneered the documentation of Ukrainian folk musics; as a composer, he synthesized vernacular with elite styles; as an activist, he promoted Ukrainian literature and culture.

Though respected among his cohort of elite composers in the Russian Empire, Lysenko's fortunes departed sharply from Tchaikovsky's in their lifetimes and beyond. At their 1891 meeting in Kviv, Lysenko shared a draft of the score for his Ukrainian-language opera *Taras Bulba* based on a novella by Nikolai Gogol-with his guest. Tchaikovsky appraised it positively and encouraged him to bring it to the imperial stage. Yet *Taras Bulba* never had its premiere in Lysenko's lifetime, in part because Lysenko resisted translating the libretto into Russian. The systematic repression of the Ukrainian languageepitomized by the 1876 Ems Ukaz, a secret decree signed by Tsar Alexander II that banned the use of the Ukrainian language in public—insured the work would not be heard. Lysenko's operas (Taras Bulba, Natalka Poltavka, Pan Kotsky, and others), which thematize the history and struggle of oppressed Ukrainians and poke fun at Russian imperial logics, have not made it into our canon.

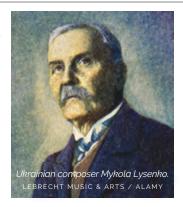
As Lysenko eerily mirrors Tchaikovsky, Taras Shevchenko (1814–1861)—the Ukrainian poet who most inspired Lysenko's music—offers a photo-negative contrast to another icon of Russian arts: Alexander Pushkin (1799–1837). Pushkin, the founder of modern Russian literature and author of *Eugene Onegin*, was born into Russian nobility. He was exiled during part of the 1820s for his provocative political poems. Before

dying in a duel at age 37, he also wrote nakedly imperialistic verses. Shevchenko, born a serf and eventually freed from bondage, went on to become the founder of modern Ukrainian literature. His poetry mounted explicit attacks on the system of Russian imperialism that attempted to repress Ukrainian language and identity. Between the years 1847–1857, Shevchenko, too, was exiled by explicit decree of the Tsar. But unlike Pushkin—who lived out his periods of exile in hedonic style or comfortable isolation, penning *Onegin* and other works at his mother's rural estate—Shevchenko was arrested, banned from writing, and ultimately held in a brutal penal colony.

That Pushkin and Tchaikovsky both ascended to the most vaunted heights of "greatness" while Shevchenko and Lysenko were ignored or mocked is a parable about the power of empire to cultivate its own myth of exceptionalism.

Eugene Onegin, set in the 1820s, unfolds against the backdrop of the system of Russian serfdom which had matured, by the early 18th century—according to historian Peter Kolchin (1998)—to resemble chattel slavery in the United States. Serfs were forced laborers, denied mobility, brutally disciplined, and deemed inferior. While the snobbish anti-hero at the heart of the story and his flowing cantilena exposes the vacuous life of the 19th–century Russian nobility, we should also listen to the phrases of Madame Larina, a landowner, and the chorus of serfs who work her estate.

The opening scenes of *Onegin* reveal the forced labor conditions that enable the glittering, aristocratic story—not unlike the milieu of *Gone with the Wind*. Take the first scenes of Act I, where we hear an offstage call-and-response chorus





of peasant complaints: "My swift feet ache from walking / my white hands ache from working / my burning heart aches from vearning / I don't know how to forget my sweetheart." Upon entering the stage, the peasants announce that they have completed the grueling work of the year's harvest. Then, shaking off their sadness and exhaustion, they apparently choose to entertain their masters. Tchaikovsky's score, with no hint of irony, shows the happy serfs commencing an ecstatic khorovod, or round dance. Tatyana is propelled into reverie by the peasant songs she adores. Later in the scene, we also witness the benevolence of Madame Larina, who offers the workers more refreshments and thanks them for their unfree labor.

At the time Tchaikovsky was composing *Onegin*, the conflation of Ukrainians with (recently emancipated) serfs was, as many scholars have noted, well-entrenched. This conflation is captured in the abhorrent

term *khokhol*, a Russian slur that bundles Ukrainians with stereotypes of backwardness, rurality, laziness, and—notably—musicality. An 1862 Moscow publication compiled by V. Dal entitled "Proverbs of the Russian People" includes a number of variations on this theme: "A *khokhol* is worth nothing, but their voices are good." In today's Ukraine, this pejorative is considered analogous to the racialized epithets that emerged from the institution of American slavery.

Both Pushkin and Tchaikovsky enjoyed considerable celebrity within the Russian Empire in their lifetimes. Both also had conflicted relationships to Tsarist autocracy, teetered at times on the edge of bankruptcy,

and were generally constrained by the conditions of life subjugated to the Tsar. And so, while it may be unfair to implicate Pushkin or Tchaikovsky in the revanchist imperialist war conducted now by Putin's Russia, we should nonetheless take this moment to think critically about the ways in which the logics of empire extend into the present, and how these two figures—perhaps above any others—have been instrumentalized for delivering ideas of "Russian greatness" to the world. Tchaikovsky's success was, after all, only possible by his complicity with an imperial culture that labeled and subjugated one people as "Little" in order to make itself "Great."

Through the limited glimpses of enserfed humanity in *Onegin*, we might pose questions about how Russian imperialism obscured the reality of Ukrainians: excluding them from the halls of prestige, outlawing their language, denying their history and agency—while condescendingly prizing their melodious voices and tuneful songs. The full-scale invasion of Ukraine this year has prompted many Ukrainians to advance sharp critiques of the enduring imperial logics that undergird the operas we program and the names we associate with transcendent "greatness." In April of 2022, Olena Korchova, a professor of musicology at the National Music Academy of Ukraine, contributed to an

ongoing debate about whether the Tchaikovsky Academy of Music in Kyiv should shed its namesake. Korchova wrote: "Our enemy is by no means Tchaikovsky himself, but only his simulacrum, the Soviet and Putin ideological brand of the same name, the attachment to which literally ties our hands, deprives us of our freedom, and turns us into hostages of a dead tradition."

For every Tchaikovsky whose music was published copiously and elevated to global stature, there are Ukrainian artists who were silenced, erased, whose names we have yet to learn. This moment of tragic awakening calls for renewed attention to the chorus—to the voices historically backgrounded, to the overworked hands and the burning hearts of people yearning to be free.

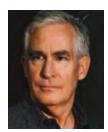

San Francisco Opera's Dramaturg Emeritus Kip Cranna chats with director Francesca Zambello about her long history with the Company and some of the innovations she helped institute in how we experience opera. Kip Cranna: We're thinking about the Centennial, the 100-year anniversary of the founding of San Francisco Opera, and we want to look back and visit some of the highlights that Francesca has experienced here. Thanks for talking with me, Francesca! How are you?

Francesca Zambello: I'm great. Kip, it's so lovely to see you and talk about a company I love so much.

KC: It goes way back. I think you made your debut in San Francisco in 1983. How did that come about?

FZ: That was my first season with the company. I had been hired a year before by the then-Head of Artistic Administration Sarah Billinghurst. I had been working at

another opera company, and, of course, I was thrilled to be asked to interview at the august institution of San Francisco Opera. I remember I flew out on a very latenight flight from Chicago where I was working and had an interview the next morning. [I] got back, I think, in time to be there for the end of the performance in Chicago. It was a whirlwind 24-hour trip. I was offered a job of assisting on several operas and given the opportunity to direct the student matinee performances of *La Traviata*. My first season—I remember it very distinctly—was *Ariadne* [auf Naxos], Ernani, Samson [et Dalila], and Traviata ... I'll never forget it.

The thrilling thing as a young director was I got to work with a lot of great directors, but I also got to direct the student performances of *La Traviata*. That was at a time [when] we did not use supertitles. I went to the then-General Director Terry McEwen—and I believe Kip [you were] in the office as well—and I said, "Why can't we have supertitles for all these kids who are here, not knowing what the heck is going on in an opera?" And so it was the first time that we did it.

We wrote them with the then-Production Stage Manager, the late Jerry Sherk, and they were an incredible success. Then Terry McEwen said, "Can we use these more?" And I said, "Why aren't we doing [them for] the *Ring*?" At that time everybody said, "Oh, no, that's a terrible idea. We can't have those for the *Ring*." So I remember he put on sale *one* cycle with titles, and that sold out before any of the others. So then they became a permanent part of the Opera, and I continued writing them with Jerry, and then, of course as it grew and grew and grew it became its own department and all of those things.

So that was really my first season, which was truly exciting and memorable, and not just for the work I got to do but the singers that one got to experience there.

KC: There were quite a lot of big stars in those days.

FZ: The cast of *Ernani*, I remember, was [soprano] Montserrat Caballé, [baritone] Sherrill Milnes, [bass] Paul Plishka, and [mezzo-soprano] Dolora Zajick was the maid. (laughter) I'll never forget that first year, the young artists included the likes of Dolora and [soprano] Ruth Ann Swenson and [soprano] Debbie Voigt shortly thereafter. It was really an amazing class of the pretty newly founded Adler Fellows.

KC: Supertitles, I wanna talk a little bit more about that, because I don't think people realize the idea of what it involved in those days. Nowadays, of course, it's all electronic, and you change things in an instant if you need to. In those days it was old-fashioned slides that you had to photograph with a camera and ... get it developed, make a slide, and put it in a carousel. It was not an easy process!

FZ: It was a very time-consuming process, which is why we had to have them pretty much done by the piano dress [rehearsal] and then we would make changes so that by the opening we would have the carousel of slides. ... I do remember a terrible experience I had. I was a notorious collector of parking tickets near the Opera House, arriving often a few minutes before I needed to be there, and I had the supertitle slides in my car for ... *The Elixir of Love.* I had all the slides in my car and I rushed in to do something, and my car was towed—and it was opening night! I'll never forget running to the car retrieval place somewhere over in East San Francisco, getting my car, and getting the slides there by the downbeat!

That was really the sort of rudimentary days, but it was so important for changing sales, and motivating the *Ring* cycle—which, of course, would sell well anyway, but the fact that it sold out one cycle immediately because of supertitles, and then they ended up adding them to the

other ones! They were a revolution to opera; the same way that, for example, now just using projections the way we use them so often as a scenic element. They really transformed more than anything, I think, the general public's understanding of the opera.

KC: I think it made a difference in what was, to some people, kind of a ceremonial experience. They didn't really know what was being talked about or said, and they just kind of followed it along, [much like] listening to a mass in Latin (laughs) Suddenly now you were deeply engaged in what was actually happening.

FZ: Absolutely. You know, as a director, you always either help write the supertitles now, or you certainly read them because they are often the way that the audience is initially receiving what you're doing. They're part of what we do, and I think an important part of having created more audiences and audience appreciation for what we do.

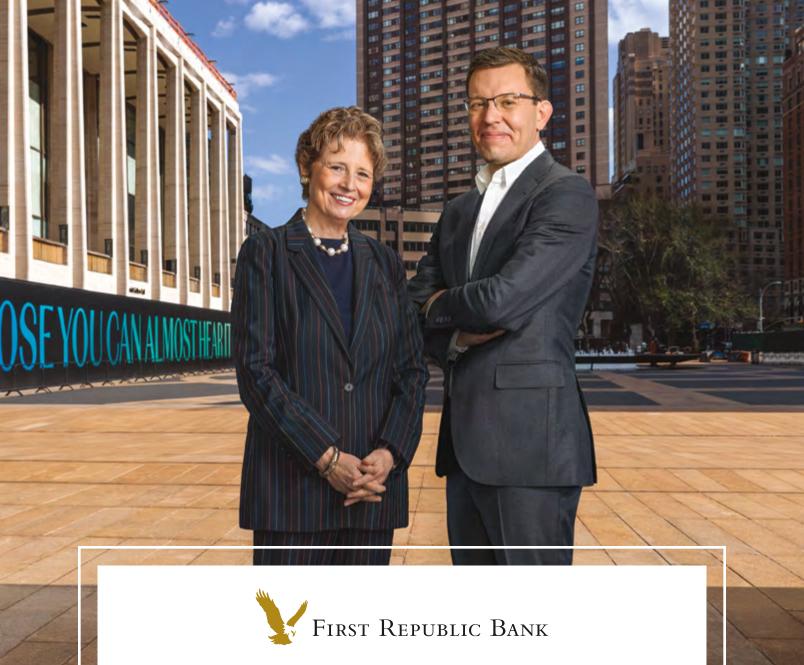
KC: I'd like to go back a little bit to the early stages of your becoming a stage director. I know you worked with [stage director] Nikolaus Lehnhoff on the *Ring* here.

FZ: I was not actually his assistant on that *Ring* cycle. I wrote the supertitles for the whole cycle (with Jerry), and so I was in many, many meetings with Lehnhoff because he was highly skeptical. He really didn't like the idea of them—and then he was won over. It was great [working in this way] because I was in a very different perspective than assisting. I was able to watch another director put together the *Ring* cycle, which is a director's dream, and I was fortunate, of course, to do it 25 years later in Washington and in San Francisco. It was important watching how Lehnhoff worked. I think Lehnoff's greatest skills were often really this incredibly precise fashion of staging. He was a highly prepared director in terms of his homework and what he did before.

That is the thing when you are starting out: If you're able to assist people, whether you think they're good or bad, you're going to learn something because just being in a theater is how you learn.

KC: Francesca Zambello, thank you so much for spending time with us as we look backward at the last 100 years at San Francisco Opera and forward to the next.

FZ: Thank you very much, Kip. Always a joy to be with you and friends at San Francisco Opera.

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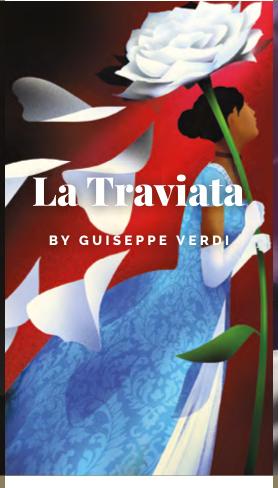
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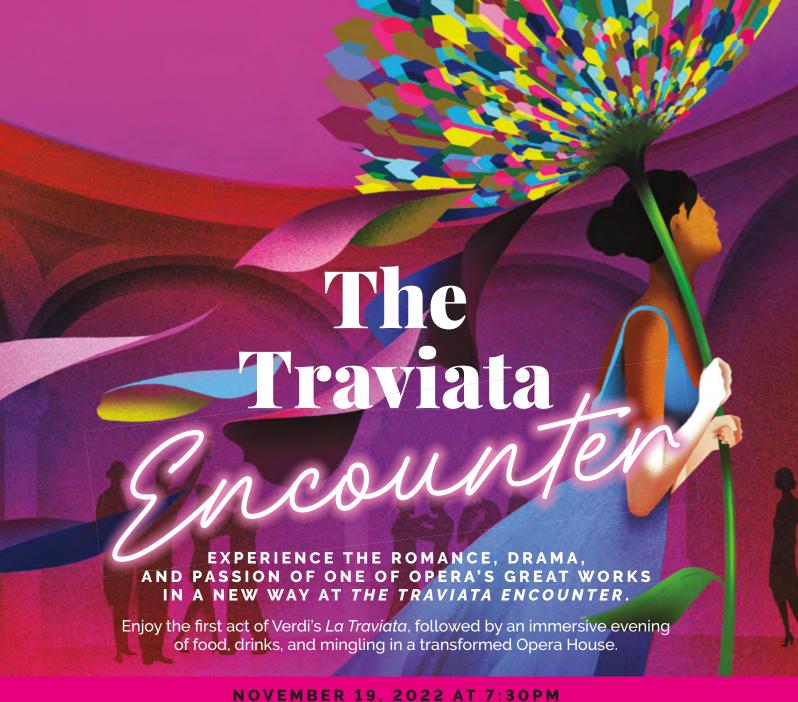
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Defining the Future

n October 25, 2017, John Adams and I had lunch together at Hayes Street Grill. It was about a month before we were to premiere his latest opera, *Girls of the Golden West,* and, despite how busy we were with rehearsals, I had to ask him a pressing question: would he write a new opera to open our Centennial Season?

Five years out from the centennial, we were just beginning to put together the framework for this most important of seasons, and we knew for certain that we wanted to begin with a new opera. While our centennial would need to honor the past, we wanted to send a clear message that the centennial was, even more so, the beginning of a new chapter.

To be able to even ask John Adams to write an opera is an honor, irrespective of the answer! John has championed new directions in opera for the last 35 years, ever since *Nixon in China* opened the Wortham Center in Houston under the general directorship of my mentor, David Gockley. John has been on the forefront of crafting an ever-evolving American musical language that holds up a mirror to society writ large. He helps us see ourselves with all our foibles and triumphs. His operas have energized our stage in San Francisco more than any other living composer. And, based in Berkeley, he is a neighbor, a member of the community, a friend. Opening our second century with a new opera by John made sense on every level. I asked my question with trepidation ...

John not only embraced the idea, he soon had a direction. He had spent that year reading every play by Shakespeare, and *Girls of the Golden West* included two soliloquies from the Scottish play (Shakespeare was routinely staged by the gold miners). John's setting of Shakespeare suggested that a collaboration with the Bard could yield extraordinary results. The incision, perception, and clarity of John's text setting allows Shakespeare to leap off the page in very contemporary and comprehensible ways. And, when he selected *Antony and Cleopatra*, with its empire-sized passion and intensity, it was clear that something red hot could emerge from this. And it has!

Over the course of the pandemic, I've had the privilege to visit with John at his home in Berkeley and sit outside with him, listening to each scene unfold. His work with our director Elkhanah Pulitzer and dramaturg Lucia Scheckner has created a tight, energized libretto that cuts to the core of this intercontinental power triangle. John's musical score pulls us into both the vastness and vulnerability of this story with an emotional veracity that is so intense that it leaves us listeners out of breath.

Just a few months ago, the Nonesuch record label released a 40-disc commemorative set of recordings of John's work, celebrating his 75th birthday. It is a beautiful collection, reproducing original album covers and smartly leaving room in the box for things still to come! As I held the set in my hands recently, I felt the enormity of what we are embarking upon here. Yes, John is the composer next door, but he is also the composer that the world of classical music looks to to define what comes next.

We get to hear that first, here in San Francisco!

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
